

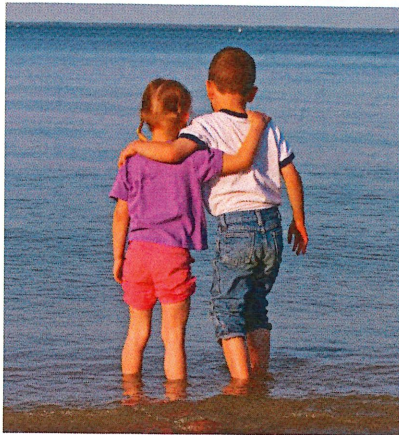

Kinship Service Caregiver Handbook



“Kinship arrangements support children and youth to maintain connection to their family and heritage, help them remain in their community, support their identity, and help them maintain their ethnicity, culture, and family traditions”



Keeping Kids Connected

We know that children do best in families. If a child or youth cannot live at home, the goal is to have them live with people they have established relationships with, such as extended family or friends. This is known as a kinship arrangement, when a relative or someone who is emotionally

close to a child takes primary responsibility to care for and raise the child. During this time, the Children's Aid Society of Algoma continues to work with the child's family to re-establish a safe home environment. Our goal is to work with families to ensure children can live safely with their families. When parents make the changes that are needed to keep their children safe and well cared for, we hope that you will continue to be a support to the family.

There are two kinds of Kinship placements – Kinship Service (out of care) and Kinship Care (in care).

Kinship Caregivers

Kinship Caregivers may be extended family members, such as grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, or friends. It could also be any member of a child's circle or community with whom the child has an established relationship. They may be friends, community members, neighbours, teachers, coaches, members of religious community, or daycare providers, who know the child and who have a relationship with the child or the child's family that may present a plan to care for the child.

Benefits to Children and Youth Living with Kin

- Able to live with people they know and trust
- Have strong sense of identity and belonging to their family
- Are more likely to remain living with their siblings
- Are more likely to remain in their community
- Are less likely to run away and have fewer placement disruptions
- Are better able to develop resiliency and the ability to grow into confident adults
- Greater sense of overall well-being reported by children

Finding Kin

When the Children's Aid Society of Algoma is involved with a family, we ask children and their parents about extended family, friends, and other supports. We make every attempt to bring together children, parents, extended family, and community.



Assessing Kinship Caregivers

Once potential caregivers are found, an assessment is done to ensure their ability to provide and care for the child.

Kinship caregivers

must demonstrate their ability to meet the needs of the child as if they were the parents in the interim. They must also complete police background and child welfare checks. The Kinship Assessment includes an evaluation of the family's strengths, needs, resources, and possibility of offering a permanent plan for the child in need. An assessment of the home environment is conducted and interviews will take place for everyone living in the home over the age of 18. During the interviews, you will talk about things like: your relationship to the child and parents, the child's needs, your health and family history, any trouble with the law or problems keeping children safe in the past and your ability to add this child to your family and still give your family what they need. All prospective kin applicants will have to consent to criminal record checks, child welfare checks, medical, and possibly personal references. The entire process from the time of referral takes approximately 30 – 60 days to complete and your Assessment worker will clearly communicate with you the outcome of the Kinship Assessment.

Responsibilities of Kinship Caregivers

- Provide a safe, secure, supportive, and nurturing home
- Participate in planning for the child
- Help the child maintain a relationship with their parents
- Be financially responsible for the child's care

Support for Kin Caregivers

Kinship caregivers are assigned a Kin Service Worker from the Society to assist them in supporting children living in their home. Although the Society does not provide financial reimbursement for Kinship Service placements, Kinship caregivers may be eligible for financial assistance through the Canada Child Benefit (Canada Revenue Agency), the Temporary Care Assistance benefit (Ontario Works) and subsidized daycare. The Children's Aid Society of Algoma may provide episodic/emergency financial assistance to cover expenses that would stabilize the placement and prevent admission to foster care.

Your Kinship Service Worker

Once your home has been approved as a Kin Service home, you will be assigned a Kin Service Worker. The role of that Kin Service worker is:

- To help create plans and goals for the child in your care
- To share information on community resources and assist you with connecting to supports
- To support you in working with the child's school or other community resources
- To help you and the child adjust to the new living arrangement
- To visit with you and the child at your home regularly



Your Rights:

You have the right to:

- Be treated with respect and in a culturally sensitive manner
- Be offered an interpreter during any visits and for all interactions with the Society
- Be involved in the development of service plans for your family
- Be involved in making decisions regarding your family
- Expect services in a professional and timely manner
- To have your questions answered and phone calls returned promptly
- Understand the legal and court process if applicable to your situation
- Be able to provide feedback or express concerns/complaints freely
- To understand how your personal information may be collected, used and shared
- To understand how you can be given access to your personal information. Please visit our website for our Notice of Information Practices.

Legal Responsibilities

If a child is placed in your home through a court order, you may have specific legal rights. The lawyer representing the Society is not able to provide you with legal advice. You have the right to speak to your own lawyer to determine your rights and options. If you qualify, you may be able to retain a lawyer through Legal Aid Ontario (1-800-668-8258). If there is a child protection proceeding regarding the child(ren), you may be asked to attend court.

How Can You Help?

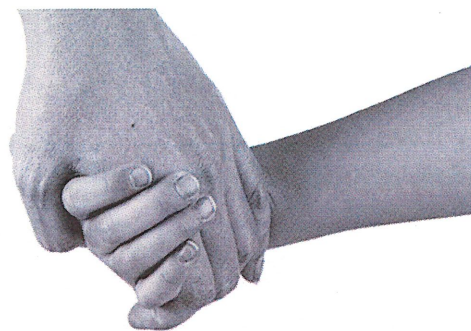
If a child known to you has been removed from their primary caregiver and requires an out of home placement for protection purposes, you may be considered to provide a Kinship Service placement for that child.

If you are aware of a child that cannot remain with the primary caregiver for protection purposes, you may also be considered to provide a Kinship Service placement for that child.

And if you are already caring for a child that could not remain with the primary caregiver for protection purposes, you may be considered to continue to provide a Kinship Service placement for that child.

1.9 times more likely to report positive emotional health compared to foster children

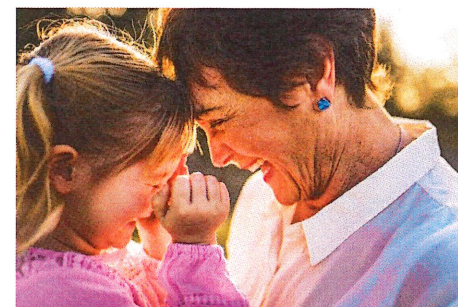
2.6 times less likely to experience three or more placement than foster children

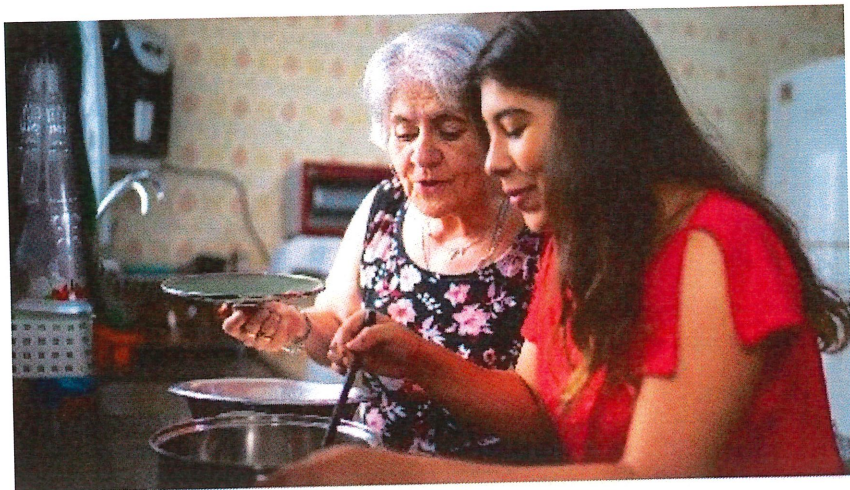
They are also less likely to need mental health services than foster children

How to Make a Complaint

The **first** thing that you can do is talk to the worker who is helping you. If this does not give you an answer to your questions or concerns, you may want to speak to the worker's supervisor.

If speaking to the worker or supervisor does not answer your questions, or if you do not want to first speak to these staff members about your concerns, your **second option** is to start a formal appeal by following these steps:

Write a letter to the Children's Aid Society of Algoma. It is helpful if you are able to do this because you can include many details about what has happened.

You also have a **third option**. You may be able to start this process by applying directly to the **Child and Family Services Review Board (CFSRB)** without first appealing to the Children's Aid Society. 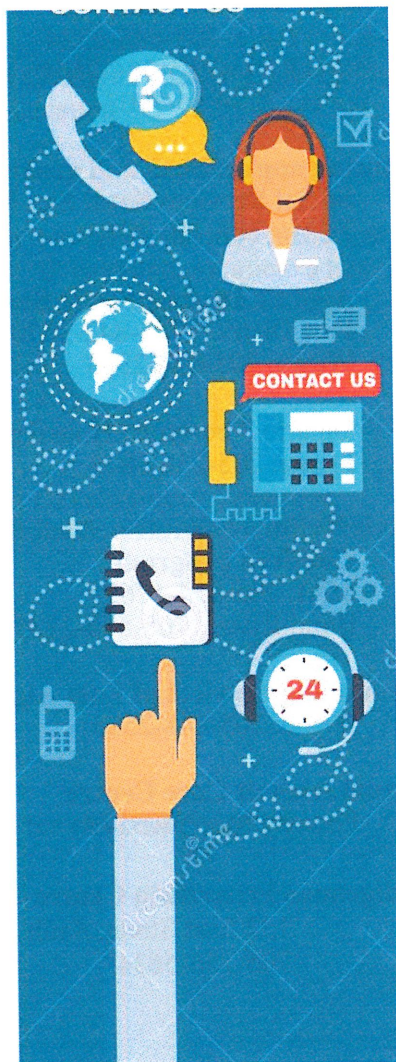

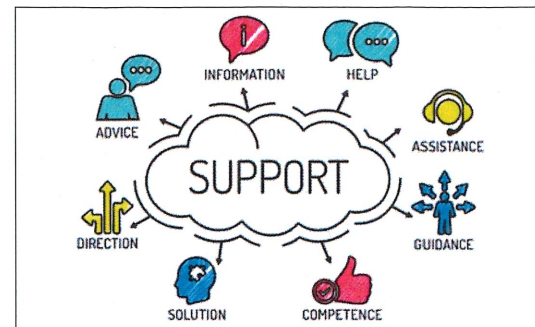
